	The AOB was established on 1 April 2010 by the Securities Commission Malaysia ("SC") under Part IIIA of the Securities Commission Malaysia Act 1993 ("SCMA") to discharge the statutory functions of the SC pursuant to section 31B of the SCMA which are —
	 To promote and develop an effective and robust audit oversight framework in Malaysia;
	 To promote confidence in the quality and reliability of audited financial statements in Malaysia;
	 To regulate auditors of public interest entities or schedule funds; and
	 To exercise oversight over any person who prepares a report in relation to financial information required to be submitted under

- To conduct inspections and monitoring programmes on auditors to assess the degree of compliance of auditing and ethical standards;
- To conduct inquiries and impose appropriate sanctions against auditors who fail to comply with auditing and ethical standards;
- To cooperate with relevant authorities in formulating and implementing strategies for enhancing standards of financial disclosures of public interest entities or schedule funds;
- To liaise and cooperate with oversight bodies outside Malaysia to enhance the standing of the auditing profession in Malaysia and internationally;
- To carry out inspection on person specified under paragraph 31B(d); and
- To perform such other duties or functions as the Audit Oversight Board determines necessary or appropriate to promote high professional standards of auditors and to improve the quality of audit services provided by auditors.

- Possess knowledge and experience in finance, business or in any relevant discipline;
- Be individuals of integrity and reputation who have demonstrated commitment to the interests of investors; and
- Understand the responsibilities for and the nature of financial disclosures as required by public interest entities or schedule funds.

6. Audit Market

As of 31 Dec 2023, there are 37 audit firms and 374 individual auditors registered with the AOB and 4 foreign audit firms and 13 foreign individual auditors recognised with the AOB. All the registered audit firms and individual auditors are subjected to AOB's inspection on a risk based basis within a pre-determined cycle.

Pursuant to the Part I of Schedule 1 of the SCMA, the public interest entities are defined as –

- (a) a public listed company or a corporation listed on the stock exchange;
- (b) a bank licensed under the Financial Services Act 2013;
- (c) an insurer licensed under the Financial Services Act 2013;
- (d) a takaful operator licensed under the Islamic Financial Services Act 2013;
- (e) an Islamic bank licensed under the Islamic Financial Services Act 2013;
- (f) a person prescribed as a prescribed financial institution under section 212 of the Financial Services Act 2013 or a person prescribed as a prescribed Islamic financial institution prescribed under section 223 of the Islamic Financial Services Act 2013;
- (g) a development financial institution prescribed under the Development Financial Institutions Act 2002;
- (h) a holder of the Capital Markets Services Licence for the carrying on of the regulated activities of dealing in securities, dealing in derivatives or fund management;
- (i) an exchange holding company approved under the securities laws;
- (j) an exchange approved under the securities laws;
- (k) a central depository approved under the securities laws;
- (I) a clearing house approved under the securities laws;
- (m) a self-regulatory organization recognized under the securities laws;
- (n) a private retirement scheme administrator approved under the securities laws;
- (o) a trade repository approved under the securities laws;
- (p) the Capital Market Compensation Fund Corporation;
- (q) any other person as the Minister may prescribe by order published in the Gazette.

Part 2 of Schedule 1 of the SCMA describes the schedule funds as follows:

- (a) a private retirement scheme approved by the SC under the Capital Markets and Services Act 2007;
- (b) a unit trust scheme approved, authorized or recognized by the SC under the Capital Markets and Services Act 2007;

	AOB is also empowered by section 31Q of the SCMA to revoke or suspend the registration; or withdraw or suspend the recognition of an auditor for failure to remain fit and proper to audit public interest entities or scheduled funds, breach of any registration or recognition conditions imposed or failure to pay any fee or charges as specified under Part IIIA of the SCMA.

Major activities and events in 2023

27 Mar 2023: The AOB released its **Annual Report 2022** – The Annual Report highlights the AOB's key efforts and activities in 2022.

26 Jun 2023: The AOB issued the **Guidelines on Continuing Obligations for Registered Auditors** – The Guidelines set out the obligations that must be adhered by a registered auditor which include issuance of Annual Transparency Reports, Statistics Gathering and Analysis Exercise, and reporting obligations when there are change of auditor and/or resignation and removal of auditor.

26 Jun 2023: The AOB issued its **Annual Inspection Report 2022** - The Report provides insights into the common findings affecting auditors during the AOB's inspections of firms and audit engagements of PIEs. Survey results on Audit Committees' use of Annual Transparency Report issued by the eight Major Audit Firms and areas for improvement was also included in the Report.

17 and 23 Aug 2023: AOB's Conversation with Audit Firms - The AOB shared the observations and findings in the Annual Inspection Report 2022 and observation on the implementation of the International Standards on Quality Management (ISQM). A total of 76 senior partners attended these sessions. Topics discussed include challenges faced by the profession and measures taken to address heavy workload.

- **6, 31 Oct and 20 Nov 2023: Capacity Building Initiatives for the AOB's Registered Audit Firms and Individual Auditors** The AOB worked together with the Malaysian Institute of Certified Public Accountants (MICPA) to organise workshops to address the AOB's Common Inspection Findings. Areas of common inspection findings covered were accounting estimates, audit sampling and root cause analysis. A total of 176 managerial audit staff or partners from AOB registered audit firms attended these sessions.
- 23 Nov 2023: Roundtable Discussion with the Institutional Investors Council Malaysia (IIC) The session was attended by the working group members of IIC which included representatives of Kumpulan Wang Persaraan (Diperbadankan), Private Pension Administrator Malaysia, Lembaga Tabung Haji and Kumpulan Wang Simpanan Pekerja.

The aim of this session was to open communication lines between AOB and investor groups for closer working relationship moving forward. AOB's function and oversight activities were shared during the session.



27 Nov 2023: AOB's Conversation with Audit Committees (AC) – The session was attended by 278 AC members representing 249 PLCs. The session included a panel discussion with auditor titled 'Impact of Climate Change and ESG Related Risks on the Financial Statements of PLCs. The discussions centered around the potential financial impacts of climate change on the financial statements of PLCs, illustrative examples of disclosure of climate risks in the financial statements and what should AC do to address climate risks.
