Section 7(1) of the Financial Reporting Act states the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Council shall consist of- <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) a Chairperson suitably qualified and experienced in the field of business, finance, accountancy or law to be appointed by the Prime Minister;</li> <li>(b) a Deputy Governor of the Bank of Mauritius;</li> <li>(c) the Chief Executive of the Financial Services Commission;</li> <li>(ca) a representative of the Ministry responsible for the financial services;</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

- (d) the Registrar of Companies;
- (e) an elected member of the Mauritius Institute of Professional Accountants;
- (f) an academic from a tertiary education institution, knowledgeable in accounting and financial reporting matters to be appointed by the Minister;

As per Section 7 of the Financial Reporting Act, the Council shall not, at any one time, consist of more than 2 members who are licensed auditors.

At present, there are 11 members (including 1 licensed auditor) and the Chief Executive Officer who attends the meetings.

It is constituted by Section 7 of the Financial Reporting Act, as set out above in 3.1.

Section 7 of the Financial Reporting Act requires the following with respect to constitution of the Council:

- (1) The Council shall consist of—
  - (a) a Chairperson suitably qualified and experienced in the field of business, finance, accountancy or law, who shall be appointed by the Prime Minister;
  - (b) a Deputy Governor of the Bank of Mauritius;
  - (c) the Chief Executive of the Financial Services Commission;
  - (ca) a representative of the Ministry responsible for financial services;
  - (d) the Registrar of Companies;
  - (e) an elected member of the Mauritius Institute of Professional Accountants;
  - (f) an academic from a tertiary education institution,

	<p>knowledgeable in accounting and financial reporting matters, who shall be appointed by the Minister;</p> <p>(g) a professional from the financial services sector suitably qualified and experienced in the field of business, finance or law, who shall be appointed by the Minister;</p> <p>(h) the Chairperson of the Mauritius Institute of Professional Accountants;</p> <p>(i) the Chairperson of the Mauritius Institute of Directors;</p> <p>(j) a representative of the National Committee on Corporate Governance, to be designated by the Minister.</p> <p>Membership of the Council reflects a wide and balanced representation among regulators, professionals, academia and other stakeholders of corporate reporting and governance. 	<p>law.</p> <p>The practice review is conducted in line with the APR Rules 2008 (amended in 2012) established by the Council under the Financial Reporting Act.</p> <p>FRC has other functions other than practice reviews. Each function in terms of methodology and material requirements is well established. In this sense, we may say that FRC has a separate inspection unit. However, due to limited resources, FRC does not have full-time inspectors to conduct the practice reviews. The personnel (full time staff of FRC) conduct both practice reviews and the other functions of FRC.</p> <p>The findings of the Audit Practice Review Panel are presented to the Audit Practice Review Panel established under the Financial Reporting Act.</p> <p>The Audit Practice Review Panel shall submit its findings and recommendations to the Enforcement Panel for consideration.</p> <p>The Enforcement Panel determines the appropriate action based on the findings and recommendations of the Audit Practice Review Panel. The Enforcement Panel recommends the sanctions which is either suspension, cancellation, warning or fine. In some cases, a letter of concern is issued. In the case of warning and letter of concern, a follow-up review is carried out in 6 months or one year time.</p> <p>The Council shall, within 30 days of receipt of the determination made by the Enforcement Panel, ratify, vary or make such other decision as it considers appropriate and it shall give written notice to the licensed auditor or audit firm, as the case may be, of its final decision.</p>
	<p><b>7.3 Please describe with an appropriate level of detail the requirements and practices regarding the frequency of inspections:</b></p> <p>The FRC has a policy whereby licensed auditors from big firms are inspected annually, whilst licensed auditors from other firms are inspected on a 3-year cycle. Licensed auditors having public interest entities, banks, insurance companies and listed entities are reviewed more frequently.</p>

For that purpose, FRC has an Enforcement Panel established under Section 17 of the Financial Reporting Act which has the mandate to determine the appropriate action to be taken after considering the findings and recommendations of the Audit Practice Review Panel (this panel has the role to conduct the practice reviews under Section 20 of the Financial Reporting Act). Of note, ‘action’ is interpreted as sanction.</p> <p>The Enforcement Panel shall inform the Council of any determination made, and the Council notifies the auditor of its final decision (that is the Council has the power to impose the sanctions on the auditors).</p> <p>The process of enforcement is provided under Section 21 of the Financial Reporting Act which stipulates the following:</p> <p>(1) The Enforcement Panel shall, as soon as practicable, consider any findings and recommendations referred to it by the Financial Reporting Monitoring Panel, the Audit Practice Review Panel, or the Council and shall, on the basis of the findings and recommendations, determine the appropriate action to be taken.</p> <p>(2) Where the Enforcement Panel makes a determination under subsection (1), it shall inform the Council thereof.</p> <p>(3) The Council shall, within 30 days of receipt of the determination under subsection (2), ratify, vary or make such other decision as it considers appropriate and it shall give written notice to the public interest entity, licensed auditor or audit firm, as the case may be, of its final decision.</p>

	<p>Yes, as per Section 76 of the Financial Reporting Act, FRC has the responsibility to review the annual reports of the public interest entities.</p> <p>Section 75 of the Financial Reporting Act requires every PIE to comply with IFRS and the National Code of Corporate Governance. In this regard, FRC reviews the annual reports to ensure that same is in compliance with the Financial Reporting Act.</p> <p>Also, Section 18 of the Financial Reporting Act establishes the Standards Review Panel which has the role to prepare Guidance on International Standards for the Licensed Auditors and Public Interest Entities.</p>

Details of the proposed amendments to the law are set out below: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Companies Act <p>The Companies Act will be amended to clarify that all PIEs will have to prepare an annual report, irrespective of their turnover, within 6 months after their balance sheet date.</p> <p>The purpose of this amendment in the Companies Act is to address any uncertainties and close a loophole in this Act and ensure consistency in the reporting requirements across different sections of the Companies Act. Also, this amendment to the Companies Act no longer allows PIEs to be exempted from preparing annual reports. All PIEs are now required to prepare annual reports, as per section 221 of the Companies 2001.</p> </li> <li>○ Financial Reporting Act <p>The Financial Reporting Act will be amended to align the definition of public interest entity with international best practices.</p> </li> </ul> </li> </ul>

FRC has taken steps to revise the definition of public interest entity in light of a comparison on the definition of public interest entity across countries and is carrying out a consultation on the proposed definition of public interest entity which may be included in the First schedule of the Financial Reporting Act. The FRC's objectives in revising the definition of public interest entity are to enhance transparency, accountability and robust oversight to safeguard the public interest in a complex and interconnected global economy. The definition is under revision.

- Established in 2018, the African Forum of Independent Accounting and Auditing Regulators ('AFIAAR') comprises regulators from 17 jurisdictions across Africa. AFIAAR serves to promote effective and harmonised regulation, build institutional regulation capacity and provide a platform for dialogue, collaboration and the exchange of regulatory best practices. The FRC Mauritius is a member of AFIAAR.

The AFIAAR has adopted a Charter where Section 7 of the AFIAAR Charter deals with the election of Officers. The term of office of the officers is set at two years with re-election being possible.

At the AFIAAR H1 2025 Members Plenary Meeting held on Friday 23 May 2025, following due process in terms of the Charter and Rules of Procedure, Mr V. Tuhobol, Chief Executive Officer of the FRC has been re-elected as the Chairperson of the AFIAAR for a term of 2 years.

FRC Mauritius is also member of the 3 AFIAAR Working Groups namely AFIAAR Inspection Working Group, AFIAAR Standard Working Group, and AFIAAR Enforcement Working Group.

- The FRC conducted a thematic review to evaluate the quality of financial and non-financial risk disclosures in the annual reports of selected PIEs. The review levered a sample of 40 PIEs comprising of 16 listed entities and 24 non-listed companies, randomly selected across seven sectors.

The FRC urges PIEs to consider the findings of this thematic review as they prepare their future annual reports. Enhanced risk disclosures not only

provide transparency but also help stakeholders make better informed decisions.

- The Chief Executive Officer participated in a joint session between FRC and audit committees of listed entities hosted by the Mauritius Institute of Directors on 14 August 2025. The theme of the presentation was 'Enhancing Corporate Reporting and Audit Quality – A Shared Responsibility'.
- The AFIAAR Inspection Working Group has organised a Webinar on 'Sharing Inspection Approaches Across Africa' which was held through the Ms Teams Platform on 27 November 2025.
